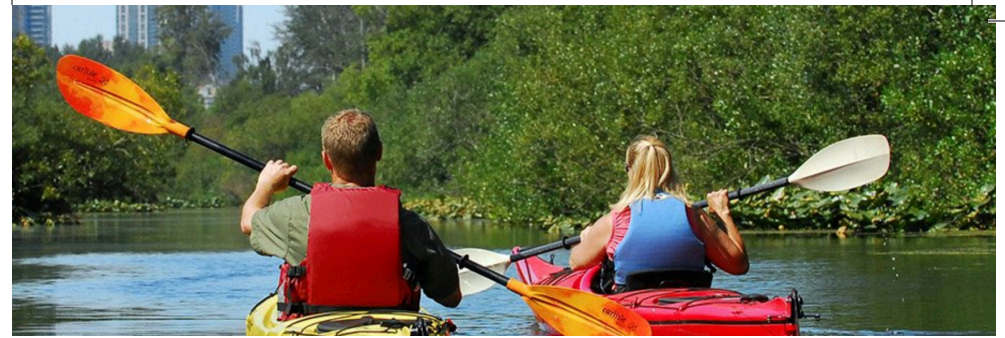

Utilities
